

# BACHARACHS WON TWILIGHT CONTEST

**Defeated Millville in Well-Played  
Game Last Evening.**

**THE SCORE WAS 5 TO 2**

**Millville Had Big Chance To Win  
in Seventh But Failed in the  
Pinch.**

Millville dropped the first game of the series to the Bacharach Giants of Atlantic City last evening by the score of 5 to 2. A great crowd witnessed the struggle and were well pleased with the performance. The two teams clash in the second game on the M. S. A. A. field Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Millville's miscues contributed largely in a Bacharach victory and Ayau was the conspicuous offender with Steinader also contributing aid

to the enemy on a couple of occasions

Ayau, generally the brilliant performer on the team, forgot himself on a couple of plays that were important. In the second inning he failed to back up Helfrich on White's bad peg, giving Potts an opportunity to tally the first run for the visiting team, and in the second stanza he failed to cover second base when White threw perfectly in an effort to get Taylor. Because there was nobody there, Taylor continued on to third and eventually counted.

Steinader's contributions : were made in the second and ninth. They were similar. In each instance there was a Giant on third and one on first. The last named alien attempted to steal second and Ray became puzzled as to how to get him. While he was wig-wagging between first and second the man on third raced home. It's an old play but was worked to perfection by the Giants.

### **Pitched Good Game**

Ray Steinader pitched a fairly good game against the colored champions and had there been air tight playing, the visitors would have been shut out. He was banged about the lot for dozen safeties, one of which was good

for three bases. gave two walks and plugged a man and as a matter of fact this sort of a combination is generally good for several tallies. Shively led the onslaught with three hits, all of them being bunts in front of the plate. He'struck out four men.

Charles White received Ray's offerings in excellent manner and smashed out a timely single when singles were most needed in the seventh.

### **Millville's Big Chance**

Millville had a big chance to cop the contest in the seventh when Nelson opened with a scorching single to centre. Yost crashed a two sack wallop to left centre and Seiferman followed with a single that chased Nelson over. White banged a hit past short that counted Yost. Hogan attempted to sacrifice him to second and fanned

and Steinader hit to Hutchinson who threw to Lloyd and he pegged to Taylor for a double and an end of the Millville rally.

### **The Giants Scores**

In the second with two down Potts waked. Shively beat out a bunt. Potts stole third and came on home when White threw badly to Helfrich.

In the fourth Taylor singled to left. He stole second and continued on to third when nobody covered second. Gatewood singled to right scoring Taylor. Pugh was out, Helfrich making a spectacular one hand stop of his bounder. C. Johnson walked and started for second. Steinader attempted to get him and while he was thus engaged Gatewood scored.

In the eighth Handy lined to right. Lloyd hit sharply to left. Yost ran back and caught Taylor's high fly. Gatewood singled advancing both runners. Pugh lefted a high fly back of first that Yost caught and pegged beautifully to White who missed Handy as he crossed the plate.

**In the ninth, Shively beat out a hit in front of the plate and stole second. He went to third on White's error, his peg to second going to centre field Handy walked and started for second. Steinader attempted to nab him but was fooled again. He threw badly to Ayau and Shively scored.**
